Kyambogo University fair on fees, poor on students' welfare

Despite all the problems that have befallen Kyambogo University (KYU) over the years, its recent graduates hold it in high regard and still consider it among the best universities in handling personal development, discipline and education values.

This is according to findings from a recent *Vision Group* survey to determine how former university students rate their universities.

Founded in 2001, Kyambogo University is one of the eight public universities in Uganda. It was merged out of the Uganda Polytechnic, Institute of Teacher Education and the Uganda National Institute of Special Education. The university was established by an Act of Parliament in 2003 and is one of the leading public universities.

However, respondents felt the university was not satisfactory when it comes to premises, study arrangement, student welfare and learning resources.

programmes, which "Our range from certificates, diplomas, bachelor's and masters degrees to masters are reviewed from time to time. The programme structure is comprehensive and includes a large portion of skills development and vocational training, where students are encouraged to use their hands. This is particularly true in science and engineering and vocational studies. Most of our students and a large part of staff are disciplined and devote a big part of their time teaching the students.


Regarding tuition, Kyambogo university charges the lowest tuition fees across the whole country. This has an effect on the quality of education, but will eventually change. The fees have not been revised for a long time, Katunguka elaborates.

However, respondents said they felt unsatisfied with the university premises, studying arrangements, student welfare and learning resources. Why is the university not doing well on the above?




The Faculty of education at Kyambogo university. The Institution is famous for teacher

The university has been constrained when it comes to infrastructure for teaching and office space. Since its creation in 2003, no new building has been put up and this, coupled with increased number of students, has caused major shortages of space. However, the situation is likely to change with the recently approved constructions funded by a loan from the African Development Bank

Major constructions have begun and will completely transform the university. The university does not have a central timetabling facility and this causes some clashes.
