its operating system, internal capacity and camera capacity, among other functions.

So what other gadgets do you need as you prepare for university?

LAPTOP

A university is not like a secondary school. At university, you will be doing coursework which most times, must be typed. This is why you need a laptop.

"Yes, there are computer laboratories at many universities, but the advantage with your own laptop is that you get to do assignments at your convenience, and even keep your notes," says Richard Kato, a software and custom hardware developer.

Although tablets may not have the versatility of a laptop computer, they are certainly an upgrade on phones when it comes to the size of display screens.

"You can do more with a tablet than a phone. You can work on a document off your tablet much more easily than on a phone," explains Kato.

Radios, on the hand, are very affordable. You can get a small radio set for sh30,000. If you can afford, Seruzi says you may buy an entertainment system, which provides beyond just radio. You can play music with this gadget, with a much better output than on a basic radio set. If you have one, please mind your neighbours. Do not make your room a mini nightclub with loud music.
